

#### 5 Popular sectors NGOs cover




### Choosing a sector




# Where are you on the NGO career stairway?

This doesn't mean the allowance can't be worth the work you do. What it means is that if your sole goal is just to make as much money as possible, then go into business not the NGO world.

Find an NGO job offer first before you write a CV that targets that particular offer. People usually do the reverse. They write a one-fit-all www.devex.com CV and splash it all over the place applying to any opening that shows up. That action alone shows how unprofessional you are. Take some time and browse NGO jobs. Just browsing NGO jobs teaches you a lot about what is needed in the world of NGOs.

# Fine tuning your CV for NGO jobs

- Don't write one CV for all kinds of jobs. If you like 5 different jobs in 5 different sectors you really have to make 5 versions of your CV, each one of them showing your experience in the job and your objectives.
- In your CV, mention specific things you have done in the past that make you have the confidence you can handle the job.
- Always try to have 1 or 2 referees in your CV
- Avoid CVs that extend beyond 2 pages.
- Don't lie or exaggerate. It's better to be honest and state that you are open to learn and that you are a fast learner.
- Always give your CV to someone who already works in NGOs to read through before you send it out.

# Conclusion

Careers in NGOs can be challenging. In fact, no career in life is a piece of cake. If you enter from the base level of the NGO career stairway, humble yourself and learn from those already in level 2 of the stairway and you will grow. The more you broaden your knowledge and skills within many NGOs, the more chances you have to make progress.
